



Why involve voluntary organisations and communities?


- part of infrastructure, in some countries
- emergencies over-stretch resources
- no single actor can resolve all issues
- volunteers and voluntary organisations are part of local communities
- a massive disaster requires a massive response






Key considerations in an emergency

- continuum: planning; preparedness; response; review; evaluation; development; prevention; preparedness......








Co-operation in the Basque region


- recognises value of volunteer and citizen involvement in civil protection

 - beach patrols




Framework for action

- effective links no duplication nor gaps








Prevention and preparedness

- involve volunteers, voluntary and statutory organisations
- communicate with and involve citizens and communities
- build community resilience
- provides a better response



Focus on capacities, not just needs


- dispel myth of helpless victims
- assess local strengths and priorities not just vulnerabilities and needs
- build on the resources and resilience found in volunteers in the community




Key messages for public authorities

Key messages for citizens


- be aware and understand local threats and risks

- can achieve more working with others






















Key points
